Review of past meeting minutes

It was moved (Zone 115) and seconded (Zone 114) to approve the January 2016 meeting minutes. Motion adopted unanimously.

Treasurer (Chris W.): "Total Contributions of \$10,964, were \$1,805 under budget. Total Retail Sales of \$10,211 were only \$378 under budget, despite Meeting Directory sales exceeding budget by \$915. Total COGS, \$4,734, was under budget by \$578, (this is good) which helps keep our Gross Profit to \$1,785 under budget.

Total Expenses ended at \$1,150 under budget. This is great, and somewhat explained by Standing Committees only spending half of their January budget, plus we had zero office maintenance costs. (*carpet cleaning occurred in Feb*).

Total Income of \$21,175.68 minus the (COGS, \$6,081.55, and Total Expenses of \$14,929.89) leaves an ordinary Net Income of \$164.24. SIG made \$119.91 from interest for the \$90k we have in the bank. Add the \$164 net to the interest Income of \$119 and we have a corrected Net Income of \$284. Any positive dollar figure is nice to see. It is, however, under budget by \$615. Historically, January can be a month in which groups contribute leftover funds from the previous year. We did not see as much of that trend this January." -*Written report submitted 2/16/16*

Motion to Approve Treasurer's Report

It was moved (Zone 131) and seconded (Zone 141) to approve the Treasurer's Report. Motion adopted unanimously.

112 (Tom): The only thing new I have is the speakers meeting at A New Beginning 1st Saturday of the month. Gotten very big. 3 meetings a day with lower turnout and need support.

Zone 114 (Larry B.): "22 people attended the last District 14 meeting. Reports from approx. 10 GSR's. Committee members are attending monthly meetings and quarterlies. A proposal was put forth to present and host a planning committee on safety concerns in AA. Proposed is a three hour panel discussion attempting to define the issues then target solutions to the issues surrounding this topic. I believe a date in April has been reserved at the Neighborhood House in West Seattle. Everyone is welcome, district funds and 7th tradition to help support the effort. Finance Committee (Mike M., Chair):

"Meeting: January 13, 2016, (2nd Wednesday of the month). The following members (Mike M, Carl G and Chris W, GSIG Treasurer) attended the monthly meeting held via a video conference call from 6 pm to 7 pm.

1) January 2016 GSIG Financials:

The Committee reviewed and discussed the January 2016 GSIG financial reports. We noted nothing significant or unusual in monthly activity and ending balances of the financials and when compared to the prior month and budget both for the month and year to date.

Monthly group donations of \$9.4k were lower by \$2.8k than budget of \$12.2k for the month however when compared to actual for December 2015 donations had increased by about \$600. The committee was not concerned with January's unfavorable variance to budget as it is too early, to infer any trends and month to month donations can fluctuate significantly without any negative trend in annual donations.

In addition, although literature sales are down the profit margins (sales less cost of product) are about 3% better than expected, as such declining literature trends are not having impact on the financial results.

2) Other Committee Initiatives

The Committee was asked by the Board Chair to brain storm on ideas and suggestions that might a) increase a group's contribution to GSIG or more importantly b) to get the approximately 560 or 70% of the groups that currently do not contribute to GSIG to consider making a donation. The following is a list of ideas. The Committee is not saying any of these are good or bad they are only meant to serve as points of potential discussion for the Board

- a) Develop a clear, concise and written summary that can be presented to groups as to the financial condition of GSIG and forecasted net losses
- b) Have volunteers, Board members and the 3rd Legacy Committee visit the business meetings for the approximately 70% or about 550 groups that do not donate any amount of money to GSIG. Explain the need and services provided and that even a donation of \$20 annually will make a significant difference
- c) Show on the monthly balance sheets the GSIG prudent reserve and compare to cash balances and net loss trend to forecast how long GSIG can continue to have negative cashflow (net losses)
- d) Include on the GSIG website a simple chart or thermometer that shows how much progress has been made for the current year in meeting the goal of total group donations that would result in "break even" for cashflows / net income
- e) Consider charging an annual fees of \$20 per group for inclusion in the schedule book for groups that do not donate to GSIG but continue to benefits from GSIG services
- f) Increase the prices or schedules or literature to make up for group donations similar to what is done by the General Service Office in New York
- g) Evaluate if the GSIG prudent reserve is too high
- h) Currently GSIG has is statement of purpose posted on the home page of its website

“The Seattle Intergroup serves the Greater Seattle area’s AA members and groups. Through the voluntary support of Seattle area meetings, we:”

- *Maintain a 24-hour phone service*
- *Publish a meeting schedule of all local AA meetings*
- *Stock a complete line of AA Conference-approved literature*
- *Act as a contact between the local AA and the general public*

The above is also included in the center pages of the most recent GSIG meeting schedule books. Continue to communicate this by any and all means, e.g. on page 1 of the High and Dry, 3rd legacy handouts for groups, verbal presentations etc.

The Committee will continue to seek and recruit new members. If you are interested in being of service please email the Finance Committee chair at financecomchair@seattleaa.org. Meetings are held monthly through a video conference so the only requirement besides willingness is a computer with a camera and speakers.”

Web & Technology Committee (Leonard T. Chair). Erin is stepping in for Leonard for this report. We met at normal time. Discussed work on GSIG website. Working on a site map. Plans in place to organize more work. Added new features such as search capabilities via zip codes or by meeting location. Norm commented on how useful this functionality is in helping people find meetings.

Third Legacy (Dan G. Chair): Will be doing a presentation at Salmon Bay. New members are joining and we are always looking for more participation.

Office Manager Report to the Board of Directors

February 16, 2015

I am pleased and grateful to submit this Office Manager Report for January 2016.

Inventory

Inventory levels are considered adequate. Sales of the new schedule books are going well in spite of the price increase to \$0.75. As more Seattle alcoholics get comfortable with our website, especially with the improved mobile app, it is a natural result that unit sales of the printed copies will go down. This will inevitably result in higher unit costs for future printings in lesser quantities. We will increase prices then as necessary to maintain margins.

Process/Organization

Office/phone weekday coverage: The volunteer staff is at full strength.

Weekday evening and weekend shifts: For group phone answering, weekend openings exist on the 1st Sunday, 2-6 p.m. and 6-10 p.m., on the 2nd Sunday, 2-6 p.m., and on the 3rd Sunday, from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Please ask your groups to call Anita.

Nightwatch shifts: When the February nightwatch calendar was published, there was one position on the 3rd Thursday at 6 a.m. Please contact David d. for the most up-to-date information or to volunteer for this four-hour slot.

Physical Plant: The skylight for the 'cute' room—2nd small conference room—is installed, and the room is back in order. We had a carpet cleaning before the Presidents' Day weekend. The high traffic areas, lobby and office area, were due for a deep clean. The maintenance expense for this is a \$430 February expense.

Financial Statements

Financial statements for January are available for your review. Group contributions were \$9,400, under budget by \$2,800, and total retail sales of \$10,200 were also under budget, by \$400. February literature sales have already

started off well, with a large order from a local treatment facility. Gross profit for January was \$1,800 under budget, but so were total expenses under budget, by \$1,200. We show net income then of \$300 versus a January budget of \$900.

Personnel

Anita attended the Western Washington Area 72 Quarterly in Port Angeles on January 9, 2016. We had a productive DCM / GSIG Roundtable on January 30 here at Intergroup. The Area Chair attended also. It is likely that the Friday night session at the Area Quarterly in April in Olympia will include a table for Greater Seattle Intergroup at the scheduled "service roundup", a speed dating format similar to the workshop preceding our last Spring Assembly. We'd like to extend a hearty welcome to Sara Ann D., whose first issue of the *High & Dry*, as its Editor, is now posted on our website.

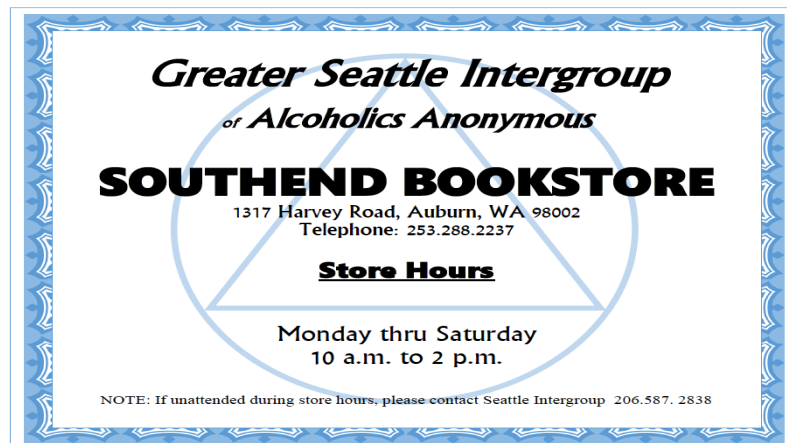
